CELEBRATING EASTER IN CHURCH THIS YEAR!

I'm really ready for spring to be here. I'm sure you all are too. The longer days are so nice now that I have recovered from the daylight savings "spring ahead". The birds are beginning to sing their greetings, the buds on the trees are beginning to show themselves, the sun is on a little higher arc in the sky—it's wonderful. Easter is approaching and I'm looking forward to a "real" Easter with all of you and celebrating the depth and meaningful joy of worshiping together on April 17th. Last Easter we were still worshiping virtually, and the Palm Sunday cinnamon rolls were delivered to cars in the parking lot as a "drive thru" event. Needless to say, I think it will be a little nicer to be able to enjoy cinnamon rolls together as we start our Holy Week and be together over three different worship services on Easter morn.

Easter is not quite as popular a cultural event as Christmas, in fact I think it ranks behind Thanksgiving and maybe even Halloween in its relative popularity. Of course, our Puritan/Pilgrim ancestors had no room for either Christmas or Easter (clearly, they were no fun). They viewed them as pagan celebrations and believed they brought out the worst in people who would celebrate in the worst ways with lots of drinking and laziness. While Christmas got a "make-over" in the 1800's thanks to Charles Dickens as well as a shift in messaging to children, giving of alms to the poor and the popularization of Santa, Easter had no such luck.

Easter eggs and the Easter Bunny are no match for St. Nick! Plus, Easter is a little more difficult to deal with in a secular way. Its story of empty tombs and frightened, amazed disciples doesn't lend itself to those who don't know the full story. At the same time, the themes of resurrection and miraculous victory snatched from the jaws of defeat are ones that if you look, can be found all over the place. The hero who sacrifices everything and gives up his own life, only to be somehow restored is one that can be found in stories from the "Chronicles of Narnia" to "Pokemon: The Movie", from "Lord of the Rings" to the original "Matrix" movies,

from "Harry Potter" to "Frozen", the theme is there in popular culture if you look for it.

"But the message of Easter, that of an adult man who was horribly killed, only to rise from the dead, is much harder to secularize. Celebrating Easter demands celebrating something so miraculous that it cannot be reduced, as Christmas can, to a heartwarming story about motherhood; its supernatural elements are on display front and center. It's a story about death and resurrection."

It's why being here at church as we tell the story of Holy Week is important. We can't rely on the world around us to tell the stories of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, or to retell the parables that Jesus used to disarm his opponents and detractors in the Temple. You need to be here at church to do that.

You won't hear about Judas' betrayal, Peter's denial and the disciples abandonment elsewhere on the most popular cable channels. There will probably not be any Easter specials to help frame the message of resurrection and eternal life in a way the kids will understand. But we'll be doing that here at church.

We'll be working extra hard to tell the stories again, to help all of us begin to understand what it means that Jesus suffered and died on the cross. That Jesus stood up to the social, economic, military, religious, and political powers of his day. When it seemed like the worldly powers had triumphed and all was lost, an impoverished, First Century, woman in the hours just before dawn discovered an empty tomb and encountered the risen Christ. God triumphs after all, and we are blessed because of it.

April 10, 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. Palm/Passion Sunday with Handbell Choir and Children

The worship begins with Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem as we pass out palms for everyone that we might celebrate like the crowds calling out, "Hosanna!" We also begin to develop some of the themes of Holy Week as Jesus speaks powerful words in response to those who would seek to bring his ministry to the poor and outcast to a close. The children will be singing, and the Handbell Choir will be ringing at the 10:00 a.m. worship. And our Fellowship Team will serve the delicious cinnamon rolls once again, after both services. April 14, 7:00 p.m. Maundy Thursday

The Maundy Thursday service of Tenebrae is filled with meaning just in the name alone. The word "Maundy" coming from Jesus' "command" to love one another given at the last supper and the word "Tenebrae" meaning "shadows". This night we share communion in remembrance of the Last Supper Jesus had with his disciples and experience the growing shadows of the worldly powers gathering to end Jesus' life and ministry. A powerful worship experience featuring a choral quartet, communion and readings telling the story of the disciples' betrayal, denial and abandonment.

April 15, 7:00 p.m. Good Friday

This year's Good Friday service will tell the story of Jesus' crucifixion, through music, scripture, and message. We recall Jesus' suffering, his last words from the cross and the pain of abandonment. An emotionally moving service of worship in which we contemplate Jesus' sacrifice for his disciples and the whole world. Experiencing the services on Thursday and Friday make the joy that is to come on Easter all the more sweet and meaningful.

April 17, 6:00 a.m. 8:00 a.m. 10:00 a.m. Easter Sunday with Chancel Choir and Brass Quartet

The 6:00 a.m. service begins in the dark and welcomes the sunrise as together we dismantle the black pall that covers the communion table to experience anew the joy of God's resurrection power that makes a way where there had been no way. The twin services of 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. feature the joyful, beautiful music of our Chancel Choir and the excitement of Brass accompaniment to our hymns. There will be Nursery care available at the 10:00 service. In each service we hear again of Mary Magdalene's discovery of the empty tombs and her witness to having seen the Lord! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!

PALM/PASSION SUNDAY PLANS

Through our commitment to purchase eco-palms, we help to protect forests, local jobs, and sustainable livelihoods in the harvesting communities of Guatemala and Mexico.

APRIL SCRIPTURE TEXTS AND WORSHIP THEMES

April 3: Isaiah 43:16-21, John 12:1-8

Communion Sunday and Fifth Sunday in Lent

Jesus comes to minister to others and becomes the one ministered to in surprising ways and by a surprising individual, revealing the possibilities of God's grace.

April 10: Luke 19:28-40, Luke 20:9-20

Palm/Passion Sunday with Handbell Choir and Children's Choir

We begin with Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem and follow him into the start of Holy Week which will see Jesus act with defiance but those who would silence him begin to put their plan together.

April 14: Luke 22:1-62

Maundy Thursday

Luke's version of the Last Supper is clearly a Passover Seder meal and Luke is careful to show that Judas too shares in the Holy Meal. This evening's service takes scripture texts from each Gospel, but the Lukan account is a beautiful telling of the story.

April 15: Luke 23

Good Friday

The final events of Jesus' life are well told in Luke's Gospel. Like the Maundy Thursday worship, Good Friday worship takes scripture text from all the Gospels in order to come up with the "Seven Last Words of Jesus" and other sections of the worship experience.

April 17: Acts 10:34-43, John 20:1-18

Easter Sunday with the Chancel Choir and Brass Quartet

The incredible story of Mary Magdalene approaching Jesus' tomb and the confusion and joyful wonder that results when she learns the tomb is empty and Jesus is alive!

April 24: Acts 5:27-32, John 20:19-31

Second Sunday of Easter

We move into the Season of Easter with stories about the community of Jesus after the Resurrection and hold our breath as Peter and John disrupt the status quo and proclaim the risen Christ.

May 1: Acts 9:1-20, John 21:1-19

Third Sunday of Easter/Communion Sunday

In the story of Saul's transformation and renewed vision, we open our eyes to new ways we might be part of an ever-expanding community of faith and witness. PAGE 6

CONFIRMATION CLASS - ACTIVE PROGRAM YEAR CONTINUES

It hardly seems possible that Confirmation Sunday is coming up so quickly next month on May 29th. The class has continued to gather on a monthly basis for classes (just finishing up a section on the Holy Spirit and prayer). This month they'll be changing gears just a bit in order to begin focusing on writing their personal "Statements of Faith" in preparation for confirming their baptism and joining the church.

The class has also continued to engage in monthly "Mission Experiences" like helping create "Birthday Kits" for the Saukville Community Food Pantry and touring the facility located at Parkside Community UCC in Saukville. They have participated in a "focus group" for Lighthouse Youth Ministry and will be traveling over to Holy Hill on April 9th to walk and pray the Stations of the Cross located on the scenic walk up to the church. The Confirmands and their families continue to provide nursery care each Sunday morning during the 10:00 worship and host Fellowship Hour on Family Sundays. Parents have been quick to volunteer as drivers and as helpers during the classes and other activities. It has been great!

Most of the congregation has probably noticed them most during their worship leadership on Family Sundays. They are a talented group and I have tried to use their gifts creatively by designing "dramatic readings" for them to offer during worship. I'm hoping that the readings have added an interesting element to the service for the kids and adults present as well as an additional emphasis for the Confirmands on the meaning of the text being used in worship when I "know" they have to be there.

We only have a couple of months left to the program year. I pray they have taken in enough to have had a meaningful experience and that they retain at least some of what we have discussed as they move into their High School years. I do hope that the addition of a regularly scheduled summer mission experience in the years to come will be additional incentive to stay connected with the congregation. Only time will tell!

FINDING EASTER ON OUR LITURGICAL WALL CALENDAR

Easter Sunday, the celebration of Jesus' resurrection, is marked with a sparkling gold panel on our Liturgical wall calendar.

Ever wonder why the date of Easter changes each year? Easter Sunday is determined by a formula using the sun cycles and moon phases. This formula was established in the year 325 at a gathering of church leaders at the Council of Nicaea.

Easter is the first Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox. For 2022 the spring equinox was Mar 20; the next full moon after that is April 16; the first Sunday after that is April 17, Easter Sunday!! Easter Sunday can be as early as March 22 to as late as April 25.

The date of Easter determines the dates for the liturgical seasons that come before and after Easter. The season of Lent is to be 40 days (not counting Sundays) before Easter Day. The day for the beginning of Lent, Ash Wednesday, also determines the end of the Season of Epiphany. The date of Easter also determines the date of Pentecost, 50 days after Easter Day, and the length of the Season of Pentecost that follows Pentecost Day.

Easter Day is the beginning of 50 days of celebration that make up the season of Easter, sometimes called Eastertide. This season of the liturgical year is marked with warm white panels on our wall calendar and among the white and gold decorations added to the panels are butterflies. Butterflies have long been symbolic of new life and are a fitting symbol for a season that celebrates resurrection and new life. These particular butterflies were also part of the original calendar created in 1996.

The seasonal marker for Eastertide on the wall calendar is a white and gold butterfly.





Opening Meditation – Kathy Bretl read a prayer by James Vanden Bosch.

Approval of the Minutes – January, 2022 – Bill motions to approve the January minutes with the spelling correction and Jason seconds the motion. The minutes are approved.

<u>Monthly Budget Review (Kathy) –</u> After reviewing the reports, Bill has asked if the \$50 amount for snow removal is from December as he has just received January's invoice for \$75. Kathy will look into it and get back to us with the answer. Mike had emailed Kathy asking if it is possible to get reports that show the beginning and ending balance of 2021 for the following accounts: checking; memorial; savings and Cornerstone. Then going forward, a report with Year To Date beginning and ending balances on a monthly basis. Kathy has not heard back at this point, but will get us the information when she does.

<u>Pastor's Moment (Pastor Scott)</u>-Pastor Scott would like to discuss the Ministry Options form that was created and sent out. He'd like to have a paper version as well as an online version that members can use to sign up. Brett Dimmer has agreed to help with the online form. The hope is to have sign ups in March and then team leaders get any names willing to help in their areas. There's hope the list educates members on all the happenings and needs of First Congregational Ministry. Pastor Scott asks if the list might be overwhelming or if there was anything forgotten. The list needs some prioritizing or organizational changes. Need to add representatives for Southeast association meeting and state annual meeting. Team leaders should be added with each category as contact and reference. Having current volunteers listed can serve as a source of contact and recognition.

Old Business

<u>Stewardship Committee Report – (Jason)-</u>The last of the pledge thank yous went out.

<u>Winter Congregational Meeting - 2022 Budget – (Kathy)-</u>It passed, but the question was asked, of council, what council would be doing to work on reducing the deficit.

<u>Capital Campaign</u> – Pastor Scott has talked with others about it. He spoke with the Property Team about the building needs. They have created a list and prioritized the list. The hope is to recruit seven or eight individuals to form a team and have them promote the campaign. They would need to come up with a theme and then present the campaign to the congregation and put it to a vote. If the congregation agrees to it then the team will need to raise funds and pledges for the duration of campaign year(s) and then allocate what on the list of needs is taken care of based on the money raised. Property Team gave some names of possible leaders that are trusted by the congregation for Pastor Scott to contact.

<u>Building maintenance updates – (Bill)</u>-Property Team will meet the last Friday of each month at 1pm in library or fellowship hall if any council member would like to join. At the last meeting the committee started to prioritize a list with some monetary estimate of cost. Property Team is wondering if they post notes from their meeting they might create communication with congregation making others aware and others might have services to contribute. Snow removal service was altered to removal regardless of depth for two entrances and north sidewalk prior to Sunday services and the two inches depth for weekdays. Mowing service was quoted in the range of \$60/\$70 with trimming once every two weeks. Bill will check his email to verify if there was a volunteer for summer mowing. Open invoices were taken care of. As far as seasonal HVAC needs they plan to keep some stock of ignition parts. Property Team is in favor of the campaign and making themselves available to make it work.

<u>2nd Fellowship Dinner (Jennifer) - & review of 1st.</u> Chili dinner coming up. Chili and salad will be held the last week of February. Game night again next Wednesday.

Port Pre-school and the future-Port Pre-school will be closing the doors. The 3K program is not sustainable without the 4K. Steps have been taken to try to rent out the space. Property taxes could be assessed if for profit renters contract to rent the space. Jennifer asked Port Pre-school about Breakfast with Santa fundraiser to obtain information to see if the we would like to take this over.

Lighthouse Youth Ministry board of directors' representatives/ Lighthouse (Savannah)- They hired Kellen to do the community assessment. The 20th of February is deadline for receiving donations for Saukville Food Panty birthday box supplies. They are trying to schedule focus group, a discussion night to dive into what is wanted by participants and congregations. Only \$125 was used from the Mission Fund to complete the \$2500 we committed to give.

New Business

<u>Change in Financial Administrator</u>- The positions description was reviewed as well as best practices to match what is current practices. They revised the description and delivered it to the Finance Team for review. They

have a couple candidates interested in the position. One of the candidates is a member. Attendance used to be required, maybe work that into the description again. A requirement of regular attendance could aid in financial control and less back and forth with questions. It feels like lack of attendance has hampered control recently.

Any other new business to come before the Council?-Jennifer suggests trying a Scrip (gift card) fundraiser. Pastor Scott recommends it.

<u>Poll – meet in person or continue to meet via Zoom?</u>-Half vote to keep meeting over Zoom and half vote to meet in person. A hybrid option (some in person as well as zoom for those that want to stay home) is talked about and Jeanne says she will poll each of us prior to the executive meeting. As long as several can make in person the hybrid meeting will be held.
