QUESTIONS OF FAITH - PART THREE

This summer I have used this space to address some of the questions the Confirmation Class was asking about as each member wrote a personal statement of faith back in May. Each year I have found Confirmation Class inspiring and challenging to lead because Confirmands often ask some of the deepest questions. So, the last in this series will be the one that all of us ask at one point or another, **“Why do bad things happen to good people?”** It really gets to the root of the problems of the world in which we live and our expectations and faith in a loving God. If God is in control and made everything, why are there natural disasters that cause thousands of people to suffer? If God loves me, why do the people I love die? Why is there cancer? Why is there so much violence and innocent lives lost?

The simple answer is, “I don’t know.” There are many possible answers out there, some are better than others. For instance, I don’t believe that God moves us around like pieces on a chessboard. And if that is true, then there is quite a bit of freedom in the world—among us human beings and even in the larger creation. I don’t believe that God causes suffering. However, because of my experience of Jesus, and understanding of who Jesus is, I believe that God’s heart breaks as much as our hearts break when we experience pain. When we weep at the death of the ones we love, or experience despair for the loss of the dreams we have, or experience suffering ourselves, or suffering of the ones we love—God feels that pain, too. God’s own Son suffered and was executed by those in power. Jesus was abandoned even by his closest friends, the disciples, in their confusion and fear. In fact, Jesus made his life more difficult by following God’s path. By loving those who were outsiders, by challenging the religious authorities of his day, by offering an alternative vision of the way God wanted the world—the religious, political, economic and military forces of the world conspired to kill him and silence that vision.

God has given us free will, but God is with us always. We make our own choices and follow our own paths, but God, through the Bible and the life of faith, *...continued on the next page...*

has offered us guidance. We are shown a path that will help lead ourselves and others to a more meaningful and fulfilling life. As the Bible proclaims, God has shown us what is good—to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with our God. Jesus used the Hebrew scriptures to highlight for his disciples ways to live in God's light: to love God with all our heart, mind and spirit, and love our neighbors as ourselves. Simply, to treat others the way you would like to be treated. But none of these is a guarantee that things will always go your way, or that you will never face hardship and pain. When bad things happen, God is with us and can help get us through.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN PLANNING TEAM

The Capital Campaign Planning Team made up of Bill Bond, Carolyn Heatwole, Jeanne Mantsch, Joe Mueller, Karen Oftedahl, Ray Shupe, and Pastor Scott was able to meet in July with the Rev. Andrew Warner, the Director of Development at the Wisconsin Conference, UCC. They are currently exploring several different ways to engage the whole congregation in conversation about a campaign to raise the funding needed to take care of several different long-term repairs of the building.

You will be hearing more from the group in the coming months as they begin putting their ideas into action. As many of you are aware, there are repair issues that will soon need to be addressed with our beautiful stained-glass windows on the east side of the sanctuary, as well as repairs that need to be made to the exterior of the stained-glass windows on the south and north of the sanctuary. The largest ticket item is the roof on the “new” section of the building which is now over 20 years old and is coming to the end of its expected lifespan. The cost of these repairs is larger than we believe can be handled by our normal yearly stewardship campaigns. Please look for more information to come in the fall

North Avenue, Milwaukee, on Sunday afternoon, September 25th. The ABHM's mission is to “build public awareness of the harmful legacies of slavery and Jim Crow in America and promote racial repair, reconciliation and healing”. The gallery and exhibits are described as both historical and memorials of the Black Holocaust, from pre-captivity in Africa to the present day in the United States. The staff from ASP helped the group learn more about the culture and economic history of Eastern Kentucky that has led to such a difficult environment in which to live. And in daily devotions and reflection they all learned a little about what it means to put faith into action in loving our neighbors as we love ourselves. Most importantly, everyone made it back home safely!

We will be having a special presentation of stories and pictures from the Mission Trip in worship on Sunday, August 14th. The group from Grafton, Pilgrim UCC will join us in worship, sharing the experience and thanking everyone for their support in making the trip possible and for their prayers while we were away. August 7: Hebrews 11:1-3, 8-16 Luke 12:32-40

9th Sunday after Pentecost


This week's passage from Hebrews: "Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." Through these texts we glimpse the dynamic nature of faith, and consider our call to reflect, learn, and grow from the past for the sake of the future.



August 14: Hebrews 11:29—12:2 Luke 12:49-56

10th Sunday after Pentecost


We remember the faithful witnesses who have gone before us this morning as we listen to a roll call of those whose faith in God is a model and encouragement. We too are called in our own time, to answer God's call to a faith that acts against the odds, sometimes in difficult circumstances.



August 21: Jeremiah 1:4-10 Luke 13:10-17

11th Sunday after Pentecost

Through our scripture texts today we watch as Jesus calls a woman from out of the shadows, listen as God calls the prophet, Jeremiah, to step up to the task. We too are asked to consider how God breaks into our lives, shaking things up and calling us to participate fully in the new life of God's healing reign.



August 28: Jeremiah 2:4-13 Luke 14:1, 7-14

12th Sunday after Pentecost

We hear God's call to authentic community in our scripture texts for this Sunday. We hear God's complaint against communities we have built in the past through Jeremiah's words, but in the Gospel, Jesus paints a picture of an open table where all are invited and where there is enough for all, forever.
