WHY LENT? WHY NOW?

Welcome to the new e-news monthly newsletter. We are so glad to be able to provide all our members and friends with helpful news and information which will strengthen our "Lenten Connections" long beyond this current season of Lent! We began our 40 days of Lent, (not including the 6 Sundays) with a Drive-Thru Imposition of Ashes on Ash Wednesday, February 17th. While the ashes are an ancient practice, our UCC churches came to it rather recently. For instance, the UCC's Book of Worship, first published in 1986, says, in the introduction to the Ash Wednesday resources, "While the imposition of ashes is not widely used in the tradition of the United Church of Christ..." No wonder I don't remember doing the ashes when I was a kid!

Easter was the first and original Christian holiday. The earliest followers of Jesus began to worship on Sunday, the first day of the week, because that was the day they recalled Jesus' resurrection. Every time they gathered on a Sunday morning; it was a little Easter. Then, once a year they would celebrate a Great Easter. Over several decades, as the church developed and spread to new cities and towns, (continued on page 2)

a tradition began around baptizing new gentile converts on Easter. To ensure they were ready to join the church, the community developed a 40-day period of preparation for baptism. Just like Jesus was in the wilderness for 40 days in preparation for his public ministry, the newly converted were prepared to enter the church membership. Often the whole church would join them in their fasting and special prayerful preparations and instruction, and so by 325 C.E. the liturgical season of Lent was officially recognized.

Because these liturgical seasons were not, strictly speaking, biblically mandated, many of our protestant churches moved away from observing them after the Reformations of the 16th Century. But in the 20th Century ecumenical movements (which gave birth to the United Church of Christ), churches like ours rediscovered their richness and have incorporated them back into our regular seasonal calendar.

I do hope you enjoy the worship services on Sunday morning and Wednesday evening and find them meaningful during this special time of year. I look forward to celebrating Easter next month, April 4th, even if it must remain online only. Hopefully, if the infection rates for Covid-19 continue to fall and the vaccination rates continue to increase, we'll be able to join together in person on a Sunday morning before too long.

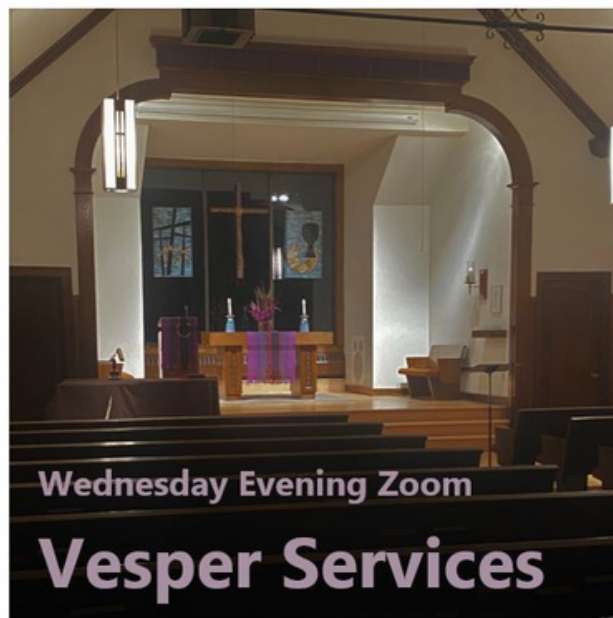
We invite you to journey through Lent with the church and with one another! We have planned ways for each of us to connect and engage with God, our church community, and the wider community.

PALM SUNDAY

The Maundy Thursday Tenebrae service will be a virtual worship service of lessons accompanied by the gradual extinguishing of lights. "Tenebrae" is the Latin term for shadows. This night we remember the shadows lengthening as Jesus celebrates the Last Supper with his disciples, the betrayal, arrest and trial.

Friday, April 2

Please join us for an online Ecumenical Good Friday worship service. The mood of the service is rather solemn, but there is also hope, as we look forward to the great celebration of Easter. We will lift the story of the passion using readings known as the seven last words. SENDING CARDS TO OUR CHURCH FAMILY

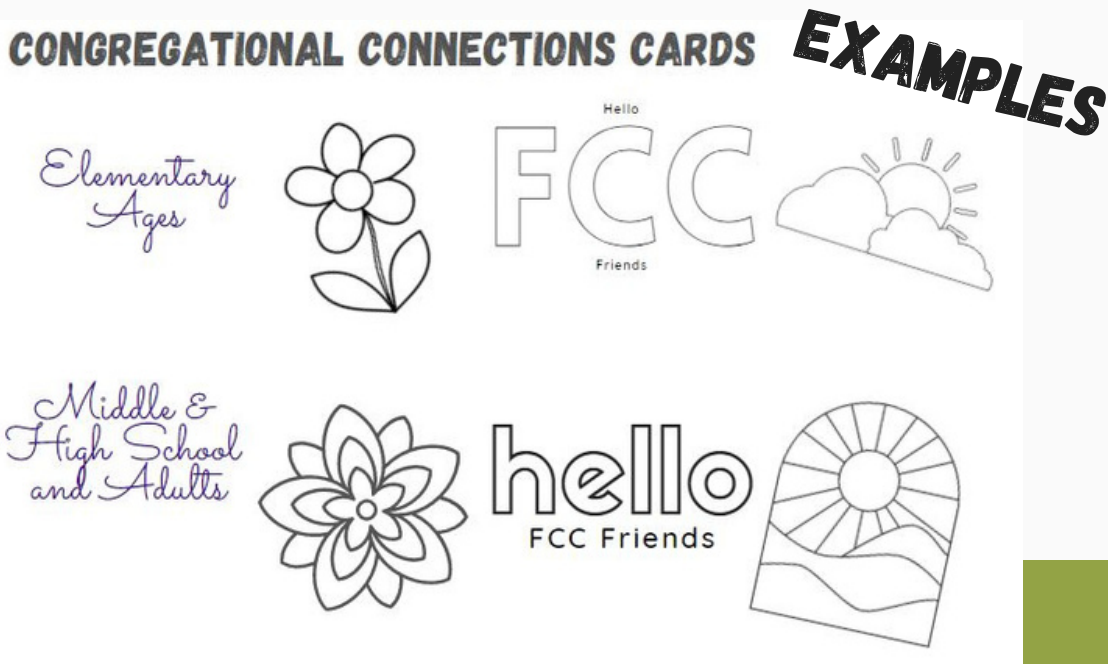

UPDATES FROM OUR FINANCIAL ADMINISTRATOR

PayPal:

Good news! We have PayPal up and running to help make giving to the church as easy as can be. Thank you to Joy Bloemer for her help in identifying PayPal as a preferred online giving platform. Please see the next page for more information.

Financial Overview from January:

Our January received contributions were \$22,930. In 2020 we averaged \$15,000 per month so this is somewhat above that monthly average. This increased amount is due to some people choosing to pay their 2021 contribution in full.

Payroll Protection Program Loan:

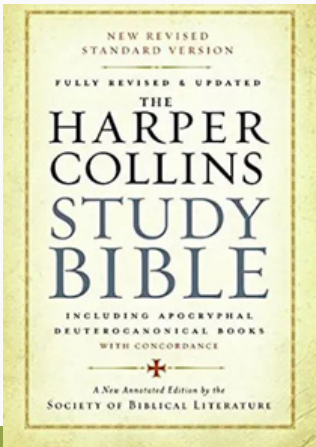
The US Small Business Administration approved our Payroll Protection Program loan request in the amount of \$34,447 and the funds were received at the end of February. After our payroll totals reach this dollar amount, we may apply for loan forgiveness by documenting how the funds were spent. In addition to spending these funds on payroll, they may also be spent on utilities. This is the same amount we received last April in the first CARES Act package and will, once again, help alleviate our budget shortfalls.

AN UPDATE FROM THE REOPENING COMMITTEE

Thank you to all who responded to our survey regarding reopening. We received 117 responses of which 46 left comments and a number left contact information. Pastor Scott is working on contacting anyone who left their information. Please see below for the results of the survey.

If you are reading this e-newsletter soon after it is released, please take a minute to fill out a **second survey** about online services and offerings. We are committed to continue online virtual and recorded services and gatherings on a permanent basis. We plan to continue to develop and improve our online virtual offerings. The deadline to respond is **March 9**.

We all are hoping and praying that circumstances will permit in-person activities at some point in the near future. We are committed to continue online virtual and recorded services and gatherings on a permanent basis. In the interest of improving and evolving our virtual church offerings we ask for some input into the level of interest and participation of the congregation.

The ROC was formed in the summer of 2020. Originally there were four of us and we met in person (outside) once and a couple times via Zoom. In January of 2021, the ROC added 5 new members, including Pastor Scott. Having new members and pastoral input is extremely beneficial to the mission and goals of the ROC.

The Wisconsin Council of Churches, a network of Christian churches and faith-based organizations, held a webinar on January 14 called "Holding Our Plans Loosely - Returning to Church 2.0". This webinar is available on their website for anyone interested in viewing. It is just over 60 minutes long. (www.wichurches.org)

The ROC is using these recommendations as our basis for deciding when and how to open. The Wisconsin Council of Churches laid out 3 levels of activity. "Unsafe to Gather", "Make it Safer", and "Safest". Within each category there is criteria regarding vaccination rates, cases per 100K and positive tests. We are using data published by the Wisconsin Department of Health Services. As of February 25, 2021, the combined data puts us just below the "Make it Safer" category.

The church building has been closed to the public since the middle of March 2020 but has never been completely shut down. Business operations have continued throughout thanks to our dedicated staff.

Port Pre-School closed in the spring but resumed operation in the Fall of 2020. They have instituted rules and cleaning protocols specific to their needs. An attorney drafted indemnification documents for the church which the school agreed to and signed.

Where are we right now? The building is still closed to the public. Virtual services will continue and will be a permanent part of our church offerings. Musicians having been adding to those services and that will continue and expand gradually. Special functions will take place only with prior approval, on a case-by-case basis, with the following considerations:

- Number in attendance should be 10 or less.
- Which space is being utilized?
- What is the duration of the function? Less than 30 minutes is recommended.
- Can it be scheduled separately to avoid overlap with any other function?
- Social distancing and masks will be required.

What does the future hold? First, all plans depend on a continued downward trend in COVID-19 infection rates. Any new surges will result in a fall back of activities until the downward trend is re-established. We are all hoping and praying that circumstances will permit in-person gatherings and worship at some point in the coming months. Unfortunately, that will not happen by Easter. In-person small group bible study is likely to be the first step, some time after April 4th. It will be limited to 10 or less each time, will be held in Fellowship Hall, following safety protocols. Based on the survey results, there will be focus on outdoor services when weather permits.

The ROC is considering many things as we look to the future, including capacity for safe distancing, traffic patterns, cleaning protocols, air filtration. The safety of all, especially the most vulnerable among us, is our top priority. Singing will be one of the last things to return.

The Wisconsin Council of Churches published their "Notes on Theology, Ethics and Values".

- Prioritize protecting the life and health of your neighbor.
- Let yourself continue to be provoked by holy experiments.
- Follow the call to love and good deeds, urgently and carefully.
- Prioritizing accessibility honors the diversity and one-ness of Christ's church.
- Take seriously the church's role as community leader.
- Believe in the resilience of the church.

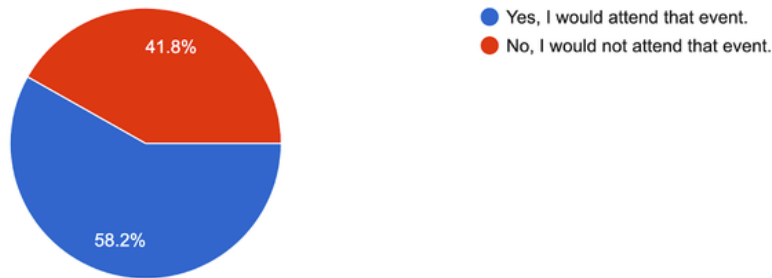

Reopening Survey Results – February 2021

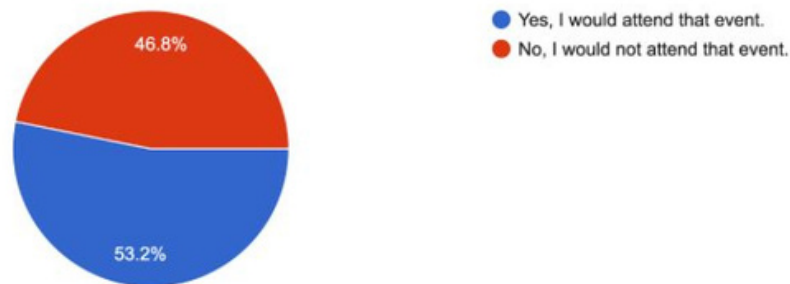
If First Congregational Church began to hold in-person small group gatherings in Fellowship Hall, limited to 10, with proper social distancing and masking.

110 responses



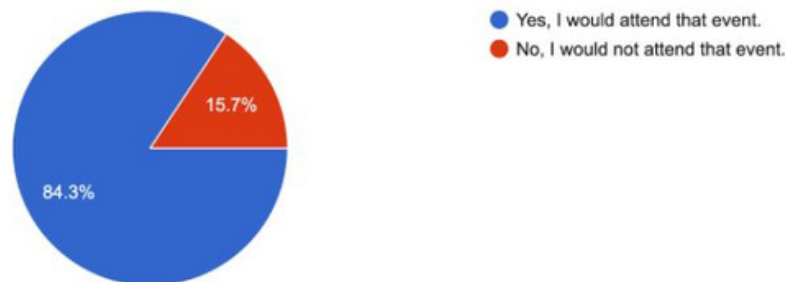
If First Congregational Church held drive-thru Communion distribution.

111 responses



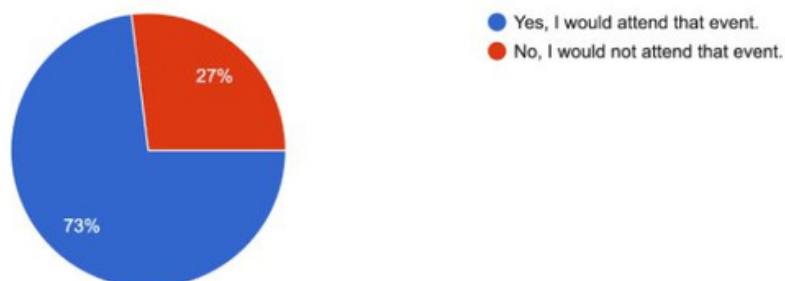
If First Congregational Church held in-person outdoor services (weather permitting).

ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING

One Great Hour of Sharing Offering (OGHS), part of *Our Church's Wider Mission*, is one of a handful of special mission offerings of the United Church of Christ. Traditionally, our church receives this annual offering on Palm Sunday. This year, let's make it One Great **Month** of Sharing (see below to learn how to make a gift)!

The work of OGHS carries God's message of love and hope to people in crisis. The UCC works with international partners to provide sources of clean water, food, education and health care, small business micro-credit, advocacy and resettlement for refugees and displaced persons, and emergency relief and rehabilitation. OGHS also supports domestic and international ministries for disaster preparedness and response.

On average, of every dollar given to OGHS, 95 cents is used directly for mission programming; and 5 cents for interpretation materials. The associated administrative costs are paid by gifts to *Our Church's Wider Mission National Basic Support*.

Opening Meditation Kathy Bretl

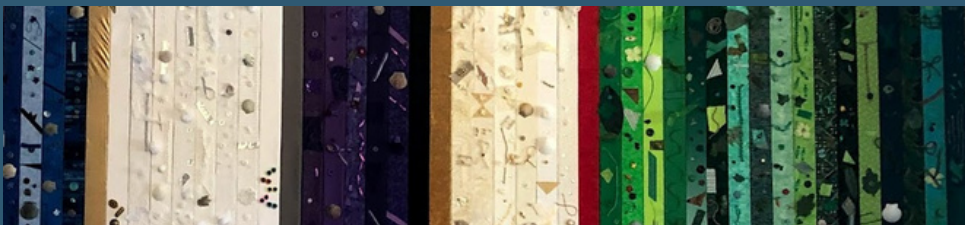
(Kathy volunteered to do the March Meditation because Jeanne inadvertently skipped right into the business meeting.)

Lorraine stated that she will be meeting with our Accountant (Bill Kirchen) next week. She also reported that we applied for and were awarded a 2nd PPP loan, with the same forgiveness rules. Lorraine presented the Port Pre-School contract for the coming school year. After some discussion the contract, as presented, was voted on and approved to present to the Port Pre-School folks. Our elevator needed work and the bill came to \$1790.75. A state inspection is also required yearly. This will exceed our budgeted amount. The total cost will be around \$2,800. Repairs are needed to the exterior sculpture. There was a \$2,800 donation earmarked for the repair by the Lenys Walden family. Work will begin when weather permits.

Old Business

2021 Budget (Lorraine)

Lorraine presented the Y.T.D. budget with a projected shortfall of \$25,000 after receipt of our 2nd PPP loan.

Window Repair Project Final Report (Jim)

This project has been completed and reported to the congregation at the January congregational meeting by Jim. Thank you, Jim, for handling this tough job.

Annual Stewardship Campaign (Jason)

Online Giving – We plan to have Pay Pal in place soon.

Jason reported that hand-written *Thank You* letters have been sent to all members that have pledged.

Reopening Committee Report

Phil reported that a survey will be sent out to the Congregation with some reopening questions, results of which will be shared with the Council and the congregation. The Wisconsin Council of Churches hybrid services were discussed. The need for a Wi-Fi boost in Fellowship Hall was discussed as a need for an option for our reopening plan.

Christmas Tree Sale Report

The final reporting on this topic showed a revenue of \$7,500 after costs.

Pastoral Care Committee – Phil reported that the committee has several additional members and will be meeting soon.
