TOWARDS A DE-CENTERED OCTOBER

During the month of September, we celebrated a "Season of Creation" each Sunday in worship. We also began a journey of "Sacred Conversations to End Racism" on Tuesday nights. Much to my surprise, the worship services and the class both began back "In the beginning" by taking a look at Genesis. In worship we used Genesis to talk about God's creation and the incredible, life-giving gifts of God in the natural world. In "Sacred Conversations..." we used the Biblical account (as well as the scientific account) noting how all of humankind emerged out of Africa—we are not so different, after all.

And, in the worship themes and in class conversation, the idea of "De-Centering" ourselves came up. Decentering refers to a person's ability to set aside their own personal perceptions and to instead see the world from another point of view. We take ourselves as well as our concerns, our perceptions, our experiences out of primary focus, out of the center, to understand things from a different viewpoint. Now it is not an earth-shattering idea. In fact, it reminds me of the old suggestion that before we make any judgements we should, "walk a mile in someone else's footsteps".

I'm sure it is something that most of us can do when we are being mindful of it. But we tend to operate out of our own personal perspective most of the time and forget that our worldview is not the only one possible. As we engage the people around us, it is easy to see ourselves as the center of the world and the only person that really matters. It is about "my" wants and desires, about "our" plans hopes and dreams. The world becomes divided into people like "us" and others like "them", working towards creating "winners" and "losers".

Decentering ourselves more consistently is an important ingredient in breaking apart the myths of racism and becoming anti-racist. It is also an important part of becoming better stewards of God's creation. (continued on next page)

By decentering my experience and really hearing the experience of others, I learn about my privilege and the advantages I receive every day. My perception of the world shifts and some of the assumptions I carry about others who are different than me begin to fall away.

By decentering myself amidst the wonder of God's creation, I see that God's world is not meant for us to dominate and subdue. We are not the center of the world, but one of God's creations out of many. The natural world has its own wisdom and its own voice that we need to listen for amidst the competing voices for our attention. When we move out of the center, our perception of God's world changes and we can begin to work with the world God has created for our mutual health and benefit.

During this month of October, I know I'm going to try and start a new habit of decentering. It is not that "my" perspective is unimportant, it is simply that I need to be mindful that I am truly not the center of the universe. That old advice, that we need to "walk a mile in someone else's footsteps" will be made new again, as I face the needs of the day. I believe we would all be better human beings and better disciples of Jesus Christ if we could keep that advice in mind.

We have 14 kids in our Confirmation Class this year. We feel so fortunate! Please be thinking of the following individuals on their journey of faith:

Confirmation parents and the members of the new class met with Pastor Scott on September 13 and told stories of baptism as well as walked through the year's schedule. The first "official" class with the fourteen Confirmands was held September 20. The class will be meeting on the third Monday evening of each month from now until Confirmation Sunday on May 29. Each month they will explore a variety of topics focusing on the Trinity, the life and ministry of Jesus, the ministry of the Church, and the life of faith expressed in discipleship on their way to writing a personal statement of faith. There will also be a monthly "Mission Experience" to encourage the class to put their faith into action. In October they will be working for a day clearing trails and cleaning cabins at Pilgrim Center (now newly named "Daycholah Center") on Green Lake in Ripon. In November the class will be working at the Port Washington Food Pantry and in December they will help with gift baskets at Family Promise of Ozaukee County.

Church members and friends will witness the ministry of the Confirmation Class during the 10:00 a.m. worship on Family Sundays and in the Nursery each week, as well as their participation in the Christmas Tree sale and special services during the year. Depending on the state of Covid infection rates in the new year, they also hope to participate in a "Faith Formation" weekend retreat at Daycholah Center (the formerly named "Pilgrim Center") in February with other UCC confirmands from all over Wisconsin. Special thanks to their parents and families for the support, dedication, and flexibility that are necessary for the confirmands to complete this year-long commitment and affirm their Baptismal vows at the end of May.

NEIGHBORS IN NEED OFFERING

After a couple years of inactivity, our Stewardship Team was reformed in June of 2020 with a list of refined roles and responsibilities. With COVID restrictions in full effect, the team met remotely via Zoom video while still having an active role in the community with the placement of two new banners outside of the church, a survey of church members and friends to help understand why we are part of our church, and a Brat Fry on October 3, 2020 to help cover the 2020 loan interest costs for the repairs to our church windows and bell tower. The Brat Fry proceeds and donations brought in \$685.94. A second Brat Fry was held June 27th of this year, raising almost \$700 to go towards the first monthly payment of for window/bell tower loan last month. We thank everyone for their support!

October 24: Job 42:1-6, 10-17 and Mark 10:46-52


Family Sunday, 22nd Sunday after Pentecost

(The August Minutes were approved at the September 9, 2021 meeting.)

The August 12, 2021, Church Council meeting was called to order at 7:03 p.m. by Jeanne Mantsch, Moderator.

Opening Meditation Pastor Scott

Our God is our rock, and God's word/water is our gift.

Approval of the Minutes - June 2021

There was a motion and a second to approve the June Minutes as presented to the Council. Further discussion led to the decision that Council Minutes published in the newsletter would be a month behind, i.e. in the future, June minutes would appear in the August newsletter.

Financial Administrator's Overview of Giving (Presented by Kathy, Treasurer) Kathy had a very short presentation of "our report of giving" through the month of July. YTD giving was \$113,631.55.

Old Business

Reopening Team report and discussion (Phil)

Phil stated that the Team met to discuss 2 proposals.

- ·Adding singing
- ·Full opening

Of the 8 members that attended the "Reopening Team's" meeting, the majority wanted to see full opening. The Council moved and seconded a motion to include fully masked attendance. The motion was passed, after a lot of discussion. Ric had to leave the meeting at this point. Kids and their participation were Jeanne's biggest issue. Scott is planning outdoor Church School.

New Business

Building Maintenance Updates - (Bill)

Our new Property Team Chair had more questions than "updates". His first question was;

• "What am I responsible for?" he was pointed toward our office staff for more clarity as to existing volunteer groups. (continued on next page)

- "Is there a budgeted amount that his committee does not need full Council approval to spend on building upkeep?" Kathy gave a short answer of yes there are budgeted amounts for certain upkeep items.
- •The Property Chair asked, "whom he should work with to apply for Conference grants for larger building upkeep project work." Scott recommended Amy and Beckie as the contacts to help with that application work.
- Lastly the Property Chair committed to the Council to have a "Building Bible" established by the end of his term to have a document "the new Property Chair can use as a general guide to the history and on going needs of our little church's building and it's upkeep. Scott offered Amy and Beckie as folks who could help identify groups and what their divisions of responsibilities are.

Funding for Microphone for Fellowship Hall use

Scott brought to the Council a request for funds (\$2,000.00 estimated) for a portable sound system, flat screen TV and a cart to move that equipment around. His vision for the use of this equipment is for meetings and other events primarily in Fellowship Hall, although it could also be used outdoors. Kathy stated that there were funds for such Church needs in the budget.

Mike Spalding asked if there could be an email blast letting the congregation know that masks would be required to attend church until further notice. Scott told the Council he would ask Amy to get the email out ASAP.

The Council Meeting was adjourned around 8:15 p.m.
